It is with Spartan Pride that I welcome you to the 2018-2019 school year! I hope the summer break gave you ample time to rest and enjoy time with family and friends.

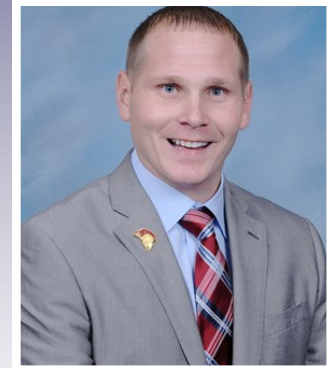

## CAREER READINESS GRANT

Last year North Schuylkill applied for and was awarded \$5,000 from the Career Readiness Mini-Grants. These awards are available thanks to the Pennsylvania Department of Labor & Industry. We applied for this grant again and submitted our application in June to the Team Pennsylvania Foundation (Team PA).

In partnership with the Pennsylvania Association of Intermediate Units (PAIU) and the 29 regional IUs, this grant will help fund career readiness work at the school district level while also fostering a greater alignment and coordination between schools and districts and their Local Workforce Development Boards (LWDBs).

## ACADEMIC STANDARDS FOR CAREER EDUCATION AND WORK

In today's challenging job environment, it is more critical than ever before that our young people complete their high school education with strong academic and work skills that prepare them for college-level studies and successful careers. The Academic Standards for Career Education and Work reflect the increasing complexity and sophistication that students experience as they progress through school. Career Education and Work Standards describe what students should know and be able to do at four grade levels (3, 5, 8 and 11) in four areas: Career Awareness and Preparation, Career Acquisition (Getting a Job), Career Retention and Advancement, and Entrepreneurship.

Pennsylvania's economic future depends on having a well-educated and skilled workforce. Students will leave secondary education with a solid foundation in Career Education and Work. It is the rapidly changing workplace and the demand for continuous learning and innovation on the part of the workers that drive the need to establish academic standards in Career Education and Work. Through a comprehensive approach, Career Education and Work Standards complement all disciplines and other academic standards. If Pennsylvania's students are to succeed in the workplace, there are certain skills that they need to obtain prior to graduating from high school. These skills have been identified in the Career Education and Work Standards.

## NORTH SCHUYLKILL

### INTERVIEW DAY

All 11th grade students participated in a "mock interview" in April. Over 15 businesses were invited and participated that day. They represented a myriad of professions and students were strategically placed according to interests. Students prepared resumes in their English classes and had a variety of discussions on interview skills, how to dress for an interview, what questions to ask, etc. Overall, this was a positive experience for everyone! We are extremely proud of the students at North Schuylkill, and we also commend the teachers and staff for supporting this opportunity. The Guidance Counselors went above and beyond to make this a successful day for everyone.



## TEACHERS VISIT HIGHWOOD USA

A number of teachers from the North Schuylkill School District recently visited Highwood USA in Hometown during one of the teacher in-service days. Visits to manufacturing companies for educators is supported by the Pennsylvania Department of Education because it reinforces career and work standards. This is actually the 3rd opportunity within the last 5 years for teachers at NS to experience this type of visit. Demonstrations are done to give the professional educator a greater understanding of job opportunities in manufacturing for students. It also provides discussions about the soft skills that are needed in today's workforce.



## TEACHER FEEDBACK:

"I was able to determine the values that are put forth in their work place that they look for in an employee that they are hiring"

"Collaboration, teamwork, and communication were three areas stressed that Highwood strives to work and live by in their everyday environment. There were a variety of expected soft skills discussed that we as teachers can highlight in the classroom and support our students with when working with them daily."

"The tour guide also highlighted basic algebra skills that could benefit students and allow them to be more successful."

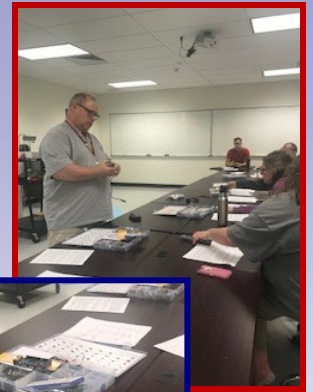

## PSSA Performance-

PSSA scores and parent letters will be sent to the districts from the state and then mailed/sent home to parents at the beginning of the school year.

The information on this page and on our website will help you to see where your child is performing and hopefully get a better understanding of what the scores mean.

Pennsylvania's standards are what teachers follow to ensure students are reaching grade level expectations. The PSSA and Keystone assessments then show where your child is at with meeting those grade level standards. There are certainly more skills taught than just the PA standards at each grade level. This is only a snapshot of student performance, but the standards are what is required and are the base of each grade level.

In collaboration with the Schuylkill Intermediate Unit 29, North Schuylkill Elementary was fortunate to host its first Spartan Summer of STEAM Explorers Program. Students from North Schuylkill, Williams Valley and Pine Grove were invited to participate in the three week session. The STEAM EXPLORERS Program was designed for students to explore the fields of SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, ART and MATH.

Ms. Tabitha Farrone, Mrs. Anne Tarantelli, Mrs. Megan Gierka, Miss Caroline Schuster, Mr. John Walsh and Mr. Travis Hinkel were the STEAM EXPLORERS' instructors throughout this amazing summer of learning.

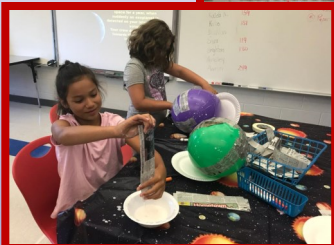
Miss Schuster's theme of study was forensics! Students studied DNA structures by creating a helix using Twizzlers, toothpicks and mini marshmallows. They also learned about GENETICS and dominant and recessive genes and created "monsters" to demonstrate their understanding of genetic traits. In their final unit of study, students learned about the significance of fingerprints as a focal point of their identity.

Mr. Walsh's theme of study was astronomy! Students learned everything they need to know about the planets, the moon, the stars, and the entire solar system. They created their own "planet" from paper-mache as a culminating activity.

Mr. Hinkel's theme of study was physics! Students participated in various activities to show force, balance and space, through games and relays.

The SUMMER OF STEAM EXPLORERS completed their program with a field trip to the Walk In Art Center in Schuylkill Haven, to learn about "Folk Art Around the Town". Students participated in Salt Rock Painting, #570 Rocks, Kite, and Sun on Metal Sheet art stations! The students had a fantastic experience!

The North Schuylkill School District Wall of Fame Committee is accepting applications to formally recognize and honor NSSD graduates for outstanding achievements.

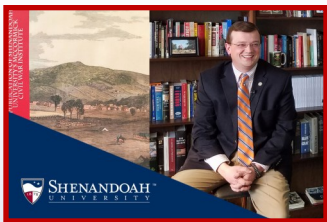
1. At least ten (10) classes must have graduated from the time of the nominee's graduation before he/she becomes eligible for election to the Wall of Fame.
2. Any alumni meeting the ten (10) year rule are eligible to be nominated and selected.
3. Nominating forms are available on the District Website or in the high school principal's office and must be completed and submitted no later than March 15th of each year.
4. Induction ceremonies for newly inducted members of the NSSD Wall of Fame will be held in conjunction with the annual NSSD Commencement Exercises.
5. Names of inductees will be showcased on an electronic display in the main lobby of the NSSD Junior/Senior High School.
6. Each inductee will receive a plaque on the night they are inducted into the Wall of Fame.



**Bill Wydra, Jr.** - Bill is the president of Ashland Technologies, Inc., Honolulu Hot Dog, LLC, Wydra International Properties, LLC, a partner in two international joint ventures – Amecosse, LLC and PAREdox Energy Sytems, LLC, a partner and Chairman of the Board for Skyline Attractions, LLC and an entrepreneur with achievements in global business and community development. His businesses have been frequently featured on PCN Tours television show highlighting many cool products. Bill is the son of Bill, Sr. and Connie Wydra. He is married to Angela Wydra and has four children; Cole, Mason, Mia and Finley. He resides in Celebration, Florida. He received his undergraduate degree from George Mason University. Some of his honors and special accomplishments are Entrepreneur of the Year, Businessman of the Year and the Manufacturing Excellence Aware. **Dr. Nicole Johnson** - Dr. Johnson is an Associate Professor at Kutztown University. She resides in Ashland. She is the daughter of Winn and Lori Nice and has one child, Isaiah. Dr. Johnson received her undergraduate degree from Kutztown University and her Masters and Doctorate from Texas Tech. Some of her honors and accomplishments are: she is serving as president of the National Division on Visual Impairments and Deaf-Blindness. Her dissertation on working with children who are deaf-blind is published in various journals. She is also widely published in peer review journals that have low acceptance rates and wrote a chapter in a book used to train future teachers of the blind. Dr. Johnson also has conducted many free in-service trainings for the Vision Resource Center of Berks County, and the Overbrook School for the Blind. She also raises money for walks for blindness, and volunteers as an advocate for parents of students who are deaf-blind. She planned and implemented several Dine in the Dark to raise awareness for visual impairments. She also serves on the Bureau of Special Education Board through the Pennsylvania Department of Education.



**Johnathan Noyalas** – Johnathan is a History Professor and the Director at the McCormick Civil War Institute at Shenandoah University. Mr. Noyalas is the son of Robert and Arlene Noyalas. He is married to Brandy and has one child, Alexander. He resides in Martinsburg, West Virginia. Mr. Noyalas received his undergraduate degree from Shenandoah University and his master's degree from Virginia Tech. Some of his honors and accomplishments are – he has authored or edited eleven books in the past 14 years. He has also authored more than one hundred articles, essays, book chapters and reviews for a variety of popular and scholarly publications. In addition to being a prolific author, Jonathan has consulted on a variety of projects including Chief Civil War Historian for the National Park Service and consultant for National Geographic's documentary series on the civil war. He is currently working on his twelfth book. He also serves the community by being a volunteer at the Kernstown Battlefield Association, the Shenandoah Valley Battlefields Foundation, a Museum of the Shenandoah Valley Member and he also speaks to students about the importance of history.



**Dr. Stacy Rentschler** - Dr. Rentschler is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Medicine, Cardiovascular at the Washington University School of Medicine, St. Louis, Missouri. She is the daughter of Donald and Judith Rentschler and is married to Dr. Stuart Friess. She has two children, Cassandra and Noah. She resides in St. Louis, Missouri. Dr. Rentschler received her undergraduate degree from Lehigh University and her doctorates from Mt. Sinai School of Medicine. She also did her residency and fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Rentschler has been awarded the prestigious Burroughs Wellcome Foundation Career Award for Medical Scientists. Dr. Rentschler's research program focuses on preventing and treating heart rhythms abnormalities that can lead to stroke and sudden cardiac death. She is serving a three-year appointment on the Weinstein Cardiovascular Development and Regeneration Conference Steering Committee. She is an Ad Hoc Reviewer for many journals and publications and is also involved in many community service projects in the St. Louis area.



**Dr. Allison Ray** - Dr. Ray is a pediatrician and partner in JDC Pediatrics Mechanicsburg, PA. She is the daughter of Charles Reh and Gail Hoffman. She is married to Bradford Ray and has two children, David and Julia. She resides in Mechanicsburg, PA. Dr. Ray received her undergraduate degree from Penn State University and her doctorate from Penn State College of Medicine. She also did a pediatric residency at Wake Forest. Some of Alison's special honors and accomplishments are North Schuylkill Class of 1997 salutatorian, North Schuylkill 700 club, Phi Beta Kappa Academic Society, Penn State University Schreyer Honors Program. At NS she was Vice-President of Student Council, a cheerleader and a member of the Swim Team. Dr. Ray also volunteers with the youth ministry at Trindle Spring Lutheran Church and is a room parent at Silver Springs Elementary.

## Breakfast Cart

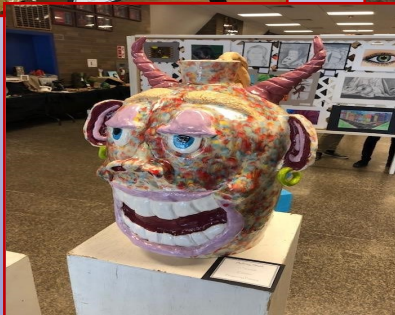
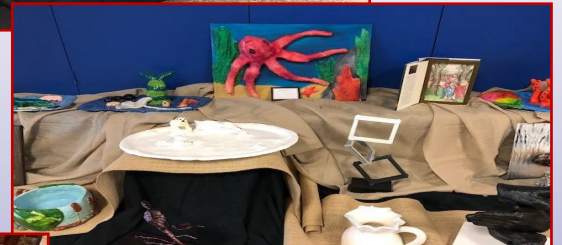
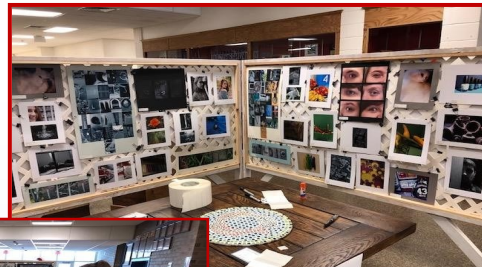
- The breakfast cart, in addition to our full breakfast offered daily, was a huge success last year. We will continue using the cart as students enter the buildings each day.

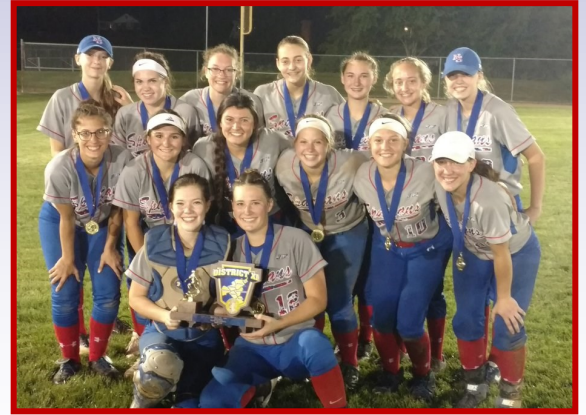
### SPARTAN BASEBALL

The Spartan Baseball Team's season ended with a tough 2 to 1 loss to Mid Valley in the first round of the state playoffs. The Spartans finished the season with a record of 18-8. The Spartans were the Schuylkill League Division 1 Wild Card winners, winning an exciting head to head tie-breaker with back to back wins over Pottsville Area and Tamaqua Area. The Spartans went on to claim the District XI AAA Championship, with a 4-0 win over Pine Grove. This was the Spartans 2<sup>nd</sup> District title in the past three years. The Spartans also won the 2018 Rothermel Tournament Championship with a comeback win over Mount Carmel Area. Congratulations to Coach Brayford, his staff, and all of our players on a great season!



### SPARTAN SOFTBALL

The Lady Spartan Softball Team had perhaps the best season in school history. The Lady Spartans finished with an impressive 25-3 record, finishing one win shy of a trip to the AAA State Championship game. Along the way this year, the Lady Spartans won the Schuylkill League Division 1 Championship, and were a Schuylkill League Playoff Runner-up. The Lady Spartans claimed their first ever District XI AAA Championship with an exciting 3-2 win over Pine Grove Area. The Lady Spartans then went onto the Class AAA State Playoffs, where they defeated Swenson in the first round. NS picked up a 1-0 win over Warrior Run in round 2, and the Lady Spartans ran into a tough Holy Redeemer team in the Eastern Final, with NS coming up just short, losing 2-0 to the Lady Royals. Haley Burd and Schuyler Ossman were also named to the Class AAA State Softball 1<sup>st</sup> team. Congratulations to Coach Grasso, his staff, and the Lady Spartans on an outstanding season!



### SPARTAN TRACK AND FIELD

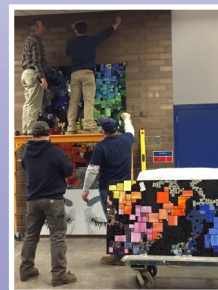
The NS Track and Field teams continued to show progress under 2<sup>nd</sup> year coach Rob Schaffer. At the All League Meet this year, the NS girls placed 2<sup>nd</sup> overall as a team, while the boys' placed 5<sup>th</sup>. Sarah Wagner won a pair of gold medals, winning the Long Jump, while setting a new school record, and the Triple Jump! At Districts, Cori McCormick, won the District 11 AA Gold medal in the 3200, and broke a school record with a time of 11 minutes, 22.2 seconds, and Sarah Wagner won a District gold medal in the Triple Jump, with a jump of 35' 11". All in all, the Spartans set a new record by sending 17 Track and Field athletes to the PIAA State Track and Field Championships in Shippensburg. Cori McCormick placed 11<sup>th</sup> in the 1600 and 3200, and Sarah Wagner finished 18<sup>th</sup> in the Triple Jump. The Boys' 4x1 team of Braden Heyer, Scott Grigas, Mitch Wagner, Brayden Boyer finished 9<sup>th</sup> overall. Emma Green was 10<sup>th</sup> in the discus. And while the Spartans did not bring any medals home with them, the entire school district is proud of their efforts and the tremendous season each of them had. Emma Green, Scott Grigas, Cori McCormick, and Sarah Wagner were all named to the 2018 Republican Herald All Area Track and Field Team! Congratulations to Coach Schaffer, his staff, and our Track and Field team members on a great 2018 season!
